Disaster Unemployment Assistance available in parts of California

SITUATION: In a press release dated August 9, 2018, the California Employment Development Department (EDD) announced Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) has been made available in Shasta County.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW: The Carr Fire began affecting the above county on July 23, 2018. A Presidential declaration of disaster was put into effect making DUA funding available. The deadline for filing a DUA claim for this county is **September 10, 2018**. After this date, the claim will not be considered timely and will not be honored. Claims are being taken by the EDD via their UI Online system at https://www.edd.ca.gov/unemployment/UI_Online.htm or by calling 800/300-5616 (English) between 8:00am and 12:00pm Monday through Friday.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) is a partnering program between the USDOL and FEMA to provide funds to state UI agencies for the payment of UI benefits under certain circumstances. It provides disaster unemployment assistance to individuals who have lost employment as the result of a major disaster and are NOT otherwise eligible for regular UI benefits.

Individuals are eligible if they lived, worked, or were scheduled to work in the affected areas and:

- No longer have a job or place to work; or
- Cannot reach the place of work; or
- Cannot work as the result of damage to the place of work; or
- Cannot work due to injury sustained in the disaster
- Became the breadwinner or major supporter of a household due to the death of head of household resulting from the disaster

DUA benefits are only payable during the Disaster Assistance Period (DAP) not to exceed 26 weeks. The weekly benefit amount for which the person may be eligible is determined by the governing laws in the state in which the claim was filed. Any benefits claimed under the DUA program are 100% federally funded which means employers' UI accounts will not be charged. While employer chargeability for regular UI that is related to a disaster varies from state to state, California statute does not provide for relief of charges to any affected employers. **As part of this declaration, the Governor has waived the one-week waiting period for disaster-related claims filed between July 23, 2018 and January 23, 2019.**

Furthermore, an extension of up to 60 days has been made available to employers in Shasta County to file and pay payroll taxes.
