### Disaster Unemployment Assistance available in the US Virgin Islands

**SITUATION:** In a press release dated September 29, 2017, the US Virgin Islands Department of Labor (VIDOL) announced Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) has been made available to residents of St. Thomas and St. John.

**WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW:** Hurricane Irma began impacting these regions on September 6, 2017. A Presidential declaration of disaster was put into effect making DUA funding available. The deadline for filing a DUA claim for these territories is October 30, 2017. After this date, the claim will not be considered timely and will not be honored. Claims are being taken in person by the VIDOL at the VIDOL Office on St. Thomas at 2353 Kronprindsens Gade and on St. John at the VI Legislature, St. John Annex 1D Cruz Bay, St. John.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) is a partnering program between the USDOL and FEMA to provide funds to state UI agencies for the payment of UI benefits under certain circumstances. It provides disaster unemployment assistance to individuals who have lost employment as the result of a major disaster and are NOT otherwise eligible for regular UI benefits.

Individuals are eligible if they lived, worked, or were scheduled to work in the affected areas and:

- No longer have a job or place to work; or
- Cannot reach the place of work; or
- Cannot work as the result of damage to the place of work; or
- Cannot work due to injury sustained in the disaster
- Became the breadwinner or major supporter of a household due to the death of head of household resulting from the disaster

DUA benefits are only payable during the Disaster Assistance Period (DAP) not to exceed 26 weeks. The weekly benefit amount for which the person may be eligible is determined by the governing laws in the state in which the claim was filed. Any benefits claimed under the DUA program are 100% federally funded which means employers' UI accounts will not be charged. While employer chargeability for regular UI that is related to a disaster varies from state to state, USVI statute does not provide for relief of charges to affected employers. This includes reimbursing employers. **As with all UI claims in the USVI, regular UI claims filed as a result of this disaster will be subject to a 1-week waiting period (if not already served in his/her current benefit year).**
